## THE INTERCESSIONS

Another name for intercessions is "prayers of petition." In these prayers, we are asking God for something. The intercessions take the form of a litany.

After a brief invitation from the presider, the litany begins. Intercessions need to be short and simple, placing our needs before an all-loving God.

The use of a *pause* is very important in the intercessions.

- The presider announces the intention.
- The assembly prays silently for it.
- The presider says "We pray as one."
- Then the prayer is presented to God by the assembly with "Gracious God, hear our prayer."

Any explanations for the intention tend to interrupt the flow of the litany. These would best be made before the prayer begins. Perhaps your class could take a few minutes as it gathers to discuss the intercessions together. That way everyone will know the background to the intention when it is announced.

Traditionally the intentions focus on the needs of groups such as these:

- our Church
- people who are disadvantaged
- people who are oppressed
- leaders of government and other organizations
- the needs of our local community
- · people who are suffering

Announcing the intention is not the same as praying the prayer of intercession.

The final petition is often for the unspoken needs that we may have but may not have shared with the rest of the assembly.
