

Final Performance Task Options for Unit 2

Important Information for Both Options

The following are the main ideas you are to understand from this unit. They should appear in this final performance task so your teacher can assess whether you learned the most essential content:

- Jesus instituted the Church to continue his mission; it is a community planned by God the Father, beginning with God's promise to Abraham.
- The Holy Spirit revealed the Church at Pentecost.
- The Holy Spirit inspired the Apostles' mission.
- The Holy Spirit gifts the Church for its mission and is present in and through it.

Option 1: The Spirit Lives!

You are a member of the newly confirmed whose continued participation in the parish youth group is to share what you have learned in your Confirmation preparation with those just beginning the process. You are to create a poster presentation that emphasizes the ongoing role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church that will open conversation among a group of twelve to fifteen teens who are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. Your goal is to help these teens to understand that the role of the Holy Spirit continues from the early Church through today. Follow these guidelines in creating your poster presentation:

- Create an outline of key points to cover in the presentation.
- Incorporate quotations, pictures, symbols, and diagrams to give your audience a visual representation of your key points.
- Write two open-ended questions to foster communication among the members of the group and to give them an opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of the role of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church.
- Write a three-paragraph personal reflection on each of your questions.



Option 2: History of the Early Church

Children's Storybook

Create a children's storybook to demonstrate your understanding of what you have learned from this unit regarding the early Church, the role of the Holy Spirit in the early Church, and the significance of the Council of Jerusalem. Follow these guidelines in creating your storybook:

- Create three five-page chapters with text and a picture on each page.
- Include a cover page (title and your name), dedication page, and back cover page.
- Include citations for any quoted material (i.e., Scripture passages or quotations from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*).
