



Below is a summary of chapter 19 of *The Catholic Connections Handbook*. However, the summary is jumbled; some of the words are in the wrong places. Make the summary understandable by rearranging the words in bold capitals and putting them in their proper places. A copy of the summary, with blanks for you to fill in, is included at the bottom.

The four **DIVINE** tell the story of Jesus' life and teachings. These stories were first passed on by word of **SALVATION** as the **PEOPLE** preached and lived lives that were examples of Jesus' message. Later, the stories were written down under the **MERCY** of the Holy Spirit, who led these authors to say without **GOOD NEWS** the truths that God wants us to know for **INSPIRATION**. The word Gospel means "**TOGETHER.**" The Gospel writers are: **JEWISH, GENTILES, SYNOPTIC,** and **US.**

Each of the human authors had his own **ERROR** of writing. Three of the Gospels—Matthew, Mark, and Luke—are called **APOSTLES** (which means "seen **WORD**"), because they are so similar. But each is slightly different. The writers had different **OLD TESTAMENT** and purposes. The Gospel of Matthew is written mostly for **MARK** people to show that Jesus fulfills the promises of the **GOSPELS**. The Gospel of Mark is written for **JOHN**, so he explains Jewish customs and words. The Gospel of Luke reminds us that Jesus came to save all **AUDIENCES** and emphasizes God's **MOUTH**. The Gospel of John makes it clear from the beginning that Jesus is truly **MATTHEW**. The second Person of the Trinity is the **STYLE** by which God expresses himself, and God who has become someone like **LUKE**.

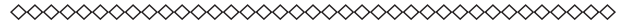
