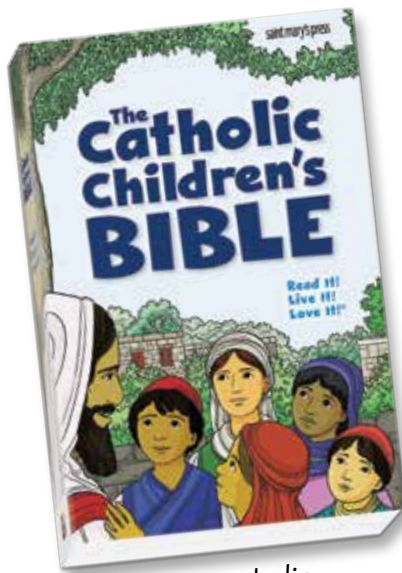

### Background Focus

Every sacrament is a treasure because every sacrament is a gift of the presence of God. Given to the Church by Jesus Christ, the sacraments bring his presence to us through human words and actions and through material elements like water, bread, wine, and oil.

The sacraments use the gifts of the material world to bring us into the realm of the spiritual. The sacraments are "doorways to the sacred." There is a particular place in the Mass in which the water and wine are mingled in the chalice, and the priest prays, "By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity" (*The Roman Missal*). Our humanity is the water. The divinity of Christ is the wine.

In every sacrament, our lives are mingled with Christ's living and risen presence. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is one of the sacraments that does not have an external material or earthly element (like water, bread, or oil) as part of its celebration. In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, the earthly element is the confession of sins. The presence of Christ, in his love and forgiveness, is mediated by the priest's hand extended in blessing and the comforting sound of his human voice: "I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" (*The Order of Penance*, 46).

**Lesson Goals** outline the key desired outcomes of the chapter.

**Additional Resources** remind you that digital eLearning lessons and family Home Guides are available to complement the chapter.

**Background Focus** provides quick, easy-to-read insights into the theme of the chapter.

A list of **Materials Needed** helps you adequately prepare for the lesson.

Two **Music Suggestions** are offered for possible incorporation into the lesson. A QR code offers easy access to all of the songs used in the program.

The **Go** section of the lesson begins with an opening prayer, which is also found in the Activity Book.

**Go (10 minutes)**

**Opening Prayer**

- Invite the children to look at page 1 from the Activity Book.
- Begin prayer by leading the children in the Sign of the Cross and then saying, "Let us remember that we are in the holy presence of God." Allow about 10 seconds of silence.
- Read aloud the prayer on the page. Invite all of the children to say, "Amen," and then close with another Sign of the Cross.

**Engage Activity**

- Invite the children to recall everything they know about Jesus. Record their answers on the board. Give them some examples if they need help. (Responses might include: born in Bethlehem, is the Son of God, healed people and taught people about God, was crucified on the cross, etc.)
- Emphasize the point that Jesus died, was buried, and rose from the dead. Remind the children that this is what Christians celebrate each year on a very special and holy day. Ask them if they can name that holy day, the greatest day of the year. (Easter)
- Tell the children that they will read about Jesus rising from the dead and will explore why that is important for us today.

**Seek (30 minutes)**

**Featured Story**

- Invite the children to find John 20:11–18 in *The Catholic Children's Bible* (page 1701).
- Direct them to turn the page and place a "Found It!" sticker next to the Featured Story (page 1702). Tell them that the text between the leaves is a shortened version of what appears on the previous page.
- Ask the children to look at the artwork on pages 1702–1703. Invite them to describe what they see in the artwork and to predict what the Bible story might be about.
- Invite a volunteer to read the title of the Bible story, and ask the children to share what the words "Risen Jesus" mean. (Jesus was crucified on the cross, but he rose again and is now risen from the dead.)
- Ask the children to share what they know about Mary Magdalene. (She was a friend to Jesus. She loved Jesus very much. That is why she was visiting his grave.)
- Read the Bible story to the group. Then ask several questions to check for comprehension, such as these:
  - Why was Mary Magdalene crying? (She did not know where Jesus was.)
  - What did the angels ask her? ("Woman, why are you crying?")

After the opening prayer, an **Engage Activity** sparks interest and excitement in the children.

The **Seek** section of the lesson invites the children to interact directly with the Bible and explore key sacrament-related themes through important Bible stories.

Images of the relevant pages from *The Catholic Children's Bible* and the Activity Book, along with chapter stickers, are included to inform teachers of the specific resources being used at different points in the lesson.

If the core learning activity would not work for your group for any reason, you may choose to use any of the additional activities on page 25 in its place.

## Core Learning Activity

## The Bible Says

- Invite the children to gather in a circle, if there is space, or to stand at their places with their hands at their sides.
- Explain that we will play a game similar to *Simon Says*.
- Give directions in these or similar words:
  - We will begin by standing with our hands at our sides.
  - When I say, "The Bible says, 'Christ has died,'" everyone will crunch down, put their hands over their heads, and repeat, "Christ has died." Then everyone will stand up again with their hands at their sides.
  - When I say, "The Bible says, 'Christ is risen,'" everyone will lift their arms into the air and say, "Christ is risen. Alleluia!" *Alleluia* means "Praise God!" Then everyone will put their hands at their sides again and wait for the next direction.
  - If I don't say, "The Bible says," then you are to stand still and do nothing.
  - If you move when I do not say, "The Bible says," you will be out of the game. The last person standing is the winner.
- Vary your directions, as in the game *Simon Says*, sometimes saying, "The Bible says," and sometimes omitting it.
- Remind the children to stand with their hands at their sides while awaiting the next direction.
- End the game with, "The Bible says, 'Christ has risen,'" to end on a positive note.

## Process the Activity

- Remind the children of the Bible story for the day and how happy Mary Magdalene was when she realized that Jesus had risen from the dead.
- Tell the children that Jesus rising from the dead is Good News that we celebrate each year at Easter. Explain that we rejoice in this and celebrate the fact that Jesus continues to be present to us in a special way today.

## Handout Options

You may wish to have the children read all or parts of the handout on pages 26–27 to supplement your presentation, or you may send it home for review with the family.

## ✕ Find (20 minutes)

## God's Treasure of Forgiveness

- Tell the children that Jesus gave us seven great and holy signs of God's love, and that these signs are called **sacraments**. Explain that Jesus is present to us in a special way in the sacraments so that we can follow him more closely. Tell the children that the sacraments give us **grace**, the gift of God's life in us, which makes us God's children and helps us stay away from **sin** and do good things. Explain that a sin is something we say, do, or think that does not follow God's Law.

The **Find** section of the lesson presents key information about the sacrament the children are preparing for.

The **Lesson Wrap-Up** encourages the children to recall what they've learned and mark their progress on their interactive treasure map.

Each lesson is anchored by a **Core Learning Activity**, which presents an aspect of the chapter theme in a fun, engaging, and memorable way.

sacraments on the board for the children, and give a brief explanation. Explain how the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist begin our life in the Church. Ask the children how they feel if they have been baptized.

During this time in Baptism, we become children of God and are washed away. Tell the children that the sins we commit are forgiven through the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Circle the word **sin** on the board.

During this time together is to help them prepare for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Tell them that this sacrament has many names.

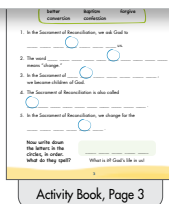
One name is: the **Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation**. Often this is shortened to "the Sacrament of Reconciliation." Another name for this sacrament is **"confession,"** because in it we confess our sins and ask for forgiveness. We say, "We are going to confession tomorrow afternoon."

Sometimes it is called "the sacrament of **conversion**," because this sacrament helps us convert, or change, for the better.

- Help the children understand that the Sacrament of Reconciliation is a sacrament in which we meet Jesus in a special way. In this sacrament, we ask God to forgive us. Explain to them that after we confess our sins and are forgiven in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we will be filled with new life again.
- Invite the children to complete the activity on page 3 from the Activity Book. Answers: 1. forgive, 2. conversion, 3. Baptism, 4. confession, 5. better, Word at bottom: grace

## Lesson Wrap-Up

- Invite the children to think back over all of the different things they did in this lesson, and invite volunteers to share some of the key things they learned.
- Take some time to get input from the group, and write their answers on the board.
- Ensure that the following points are made, write them on the board, and circle them:
  - Christ died, rose from the dead, and is with us now.
  - We meet Jesus in the sacraments.
  - We confess our sins and are forgiven by God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.
- Ask the children to place the chapter 1 sticker in the correct circle on their treasure map.
- Remind the children to have their parents read the family page on page 4 from the Activity Book with them at home.
- Invite the children to complete the chapter 1 digital eLearning lesson at home for review, alone or with their family.

## Additional Activities

Chapter 1

### Materials Needed

- none

### God Calls Me by Name (15 minutes)

- Invite the children to gather in a circle. Introduce yourself first, saying, "My name is \_\_\_\_, and I like \_\_\_\_." (Name something that starts with the first letter of your first name. For example, "I am Sara, and I like sassafras.")
- Instruct the child next to you to say your name and add theirs. (For example: "She is Sara, and she likes sassafras. My name is Lucy, and I like licorice.")
- The next child will say all three names and likes, including their own. (The group may help as needed, because the game will get more difficult. Keep the atmosphere light and fun, so no one feels inadequate for not being able to remember all the preceding names and likes.)
- At the end of the game, ask the children: "Did we have trouble remembering everyone's name and what they liked? (Yes) Does God have trouble remembering our names and what we like and don't like? (No) Why not? (God is all-knowing and all-loving. He loves us and knows us best of all.)
- Remind the children that they became children of God at Baptism.

### Materials Needed

- plastic spoons, one for each child
- several plastic Easter eggs

### Easter Egg Relay (15 minutes)

- Arrange the children into groups of four. Give each child in the group a plastic spoon.
- Invite the children in each group to stand together in a line, and give the first child in each line a plastic egg to balance on their spoon.
- Explain that this is a relay race and that the first person in the line will carry the egg on their spoon to the other end of the room and back. Tell them that if they drop the egg, they must come back to the front of the line and start over. (This rule can be skipped if this proves too difficult for the children.)
- Continue by telling the children that when they return, they should move the egg to the next person's spoon, trying not to use their hands. Explain that this person will then go to the other end of the room and back and that the race will continue until the last person in each group returns.
- Tell the children that the first group to have all members return wins.
- Explain that the Easter egg reminds us that Jesus rose from the dead. Just like a baby chick breaks out of an egg, so Jesus left the tomb and is with us today.

### Materials Needed

- a computer with internet access
- a computer projector

### Jesus Loves Me (15 minutes)

- Show the video "Hey! Jesus loves me!," available on YouTube (3:48). This video, with lyrics, can be used to emphasize how much Jesus loves each one of us and how he is always ready to show us mercy.
- Invite volunteers to recall some of the ideas in the song.
- Remind the children that Jesus died and rose again to show us how much he loves us.

# Chapter 1

## Jesus Is Always with Us



### Introduction

Do you remember celebrating Christmas? You may remember that Christmas is the day that Jesus was born. God gave his Son, Jesus, to us to save us and to lead us back to him. When Jesus lived on the earth with us, people could hear what he said and see what he did through his words and actions. What a wonderful gift God the Father gave us!

Do you remember celebrating Easter? At Easter, we celebrate that Jesus rose from the dead for us and lives with us forever. We no longer see Jesus as he walked on the earth, but he still gives his life to us. He gives his life to us now through the sacraments. Through the Sacraments, Jesus is with us always.

### Scripture Story: Jesus Appears to Mary Magdalene

In this Scripture passage, we find out what happened when Jesus rose from the dead. He met his friend Mary. Let's read together:

Mary stood crying outside the tomb. While she was still crying, she bent over and looked in the tomb and saw two angels there dressed in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been, one at the head and the other at the feet. "Woman, why are you crying?" they asked her.

She answered, "They have taken my Lord away, and I do not know where they have put him!"

Then she turned around and saw Jesus standing there; but she did not know that it was Jesus. . . .

Jesus said to her, "Mary!" (John 20:11-14, 16)

Look at the title of the story. Do you know what "Risen Jesus" means? It means that Jesus was crucified on the cross but rose from the dead to live forever.

Who was Mary Magdalene? She was a friend to Jesus. She loved Jesus very much. That is why she was visiting his tomb, or grave. She was crying because she did not know where Jesus was. But when Mary Magdalene turned around, she saw Jesus! Later Jesus would appear to his other followers.

This is the story of the very first Easter Sunday, when Jesus rose from the dead. Each year at Easter, we celebrate that the Risen Jesus is with us today. One special way he is with us is in the Seven Sacraments.

### Jesus Gave Us the Sacraments

Jesus gave us seven great and holy signs of God's love. These signs are called sacraments. Jesus is present to us in a special way in the

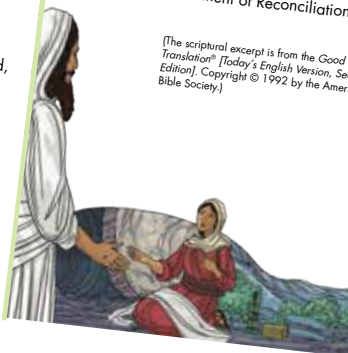
- We often call this sacrament confession, because in it we confess what we have done wrong. We say, "We are going to confession tomorrow afternoon."
- Sometimes it is called the sacrament of conversion, because this sacrament helps us convert, or change, for the better.

In the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we ask God to forgive us. After we confess our sins and are forgiven, our new life with God will be strengthened if it had been weakened or lost if it had been lost.

### Things to Remember

- Christ died, rose from the dead, and is with us now.
- We meet Jesus in the sacraments.
- The new life with God that we receive in Baptism is weakened by our sins or even lost if it is a big sin.
- We confess our sins and are forgiven by God in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

many. The Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and the Eucharist begin our life in the Church and are called the Sacraments of Christian Initiation. Do you know the date of your Baptism? Ask your parents to tell you.

### God's Treasure of Forgiveness

In Baptism, we become children of God and start a new life with God. All of our sins are washed away. If we sin after we are baptized, our new life with God is weakened—or even lost if it is a big sin. That is why we have the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation, to forgive the sins we commit after we are baptized.

The Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation has many names:

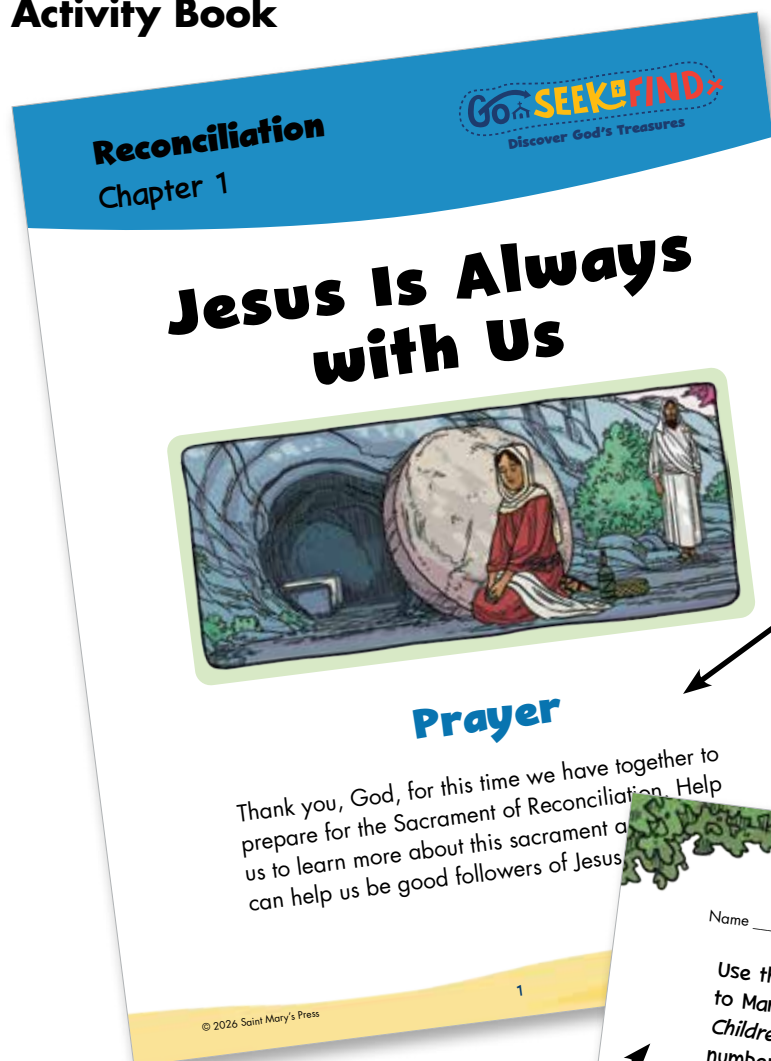
- Its official Church name is the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation. Often this is shortened to "the Sacrament of Penance" or "the Sacrament of Reconciliation."

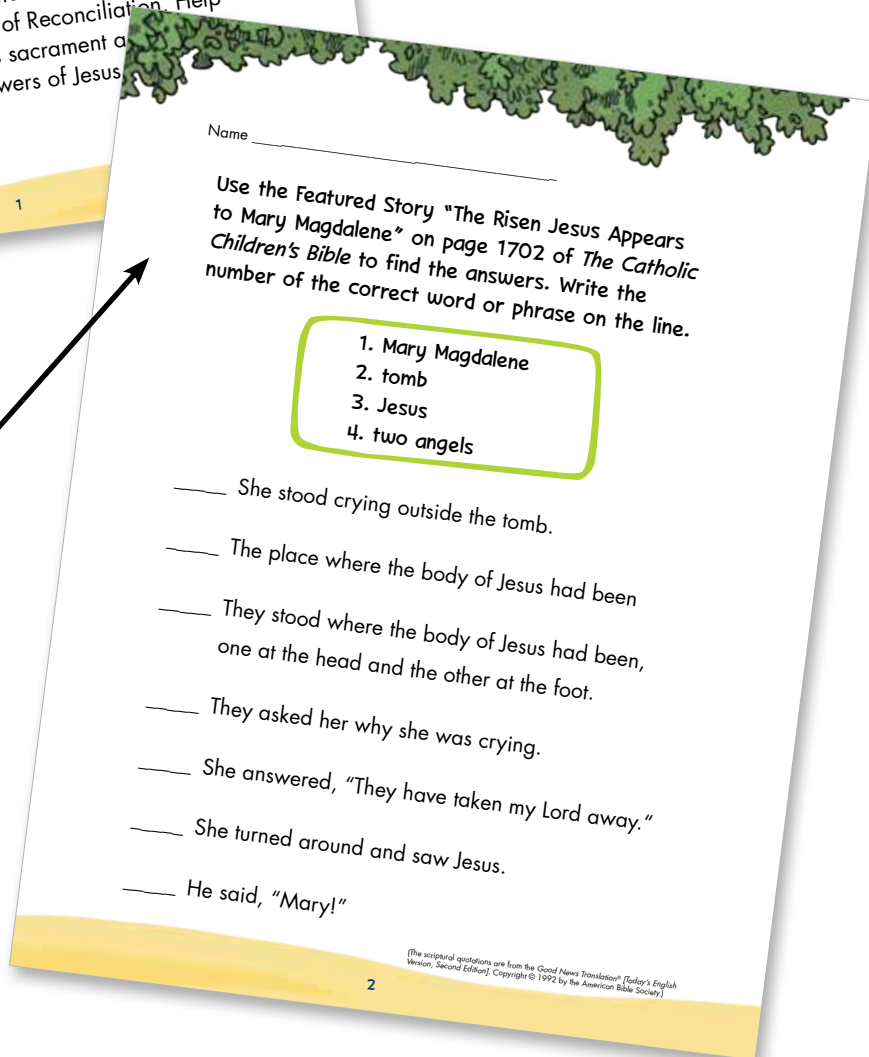

The sacraments use the gifts of the material world to bring us into the realm of the spiritual. The particular place in the Mass in which the water and wine are mingled in the chalice, and the priest prays, "By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity" (*The Roman Missal*). Our humanity is the water. The divinity of Christ is the wine.

### Family Strategies

Our first community is the family, and learning to live in harmony at home is a first lesson in living in harmony with others. Harmony often involves following rules and procedures for the good of all. Present and enforce these rules and procedures as a source of family pride and identity. For example: In our family, we do not use electronics during meals; in our family, we do not call names; in our family, we serve guests first. You may soon hear your child explaining proudly to friends, "In our family . . ."

### Family Activities

- Congratulate your child on beginning to prepare for Reconciliation. Talk about the sacrament together, and present the sacrament as an opportunity to experience God's love and forgiveness and a chance to start over.
- Read together the Featured story on page 1702 of *The Catholic Children's Bible* (John 20:11–14, 16), or the longer version, (John 20:11–29). Remind your child that the Risen Jesus will be present at the Sacrament of Reconciliation but will not be seen.
- Watch the YouTube video "In Good Hands (Baby Dedication Song) Studio Version with Lyrics," by Ben Chilcote (5:04), which expresses a parental perspective on caring for "God's child." Emphasize to your child that we are precious to God and are in God's good hands our entire lives.

### Pray It!



Pray this prayer together as a family, beginning and ending with the Sign of the Cross.

Risen Jesus, be with us each moment, especially as [name of child] prepares to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Help us all to become good followers of Jesus. Amen.

# Key Elements of the Program

- The **Seek** section invites the children to explore Scripture related to the sacrament of focus and to participate in a core activity that deepens their understanding of the chapter's message.
- The **Find** section offers a richer insight into the meaning of the sacrament, wraps up the lesson with a helpful summary, and closes with prayer.

## Activity Book

The colorful and engaging Activity Book includes pages for each chapter. Every lesson begins with a page that includes the chapter's opening prayer, followed by two activity pages that reinforce the learning. A family page accompanies each chapter, offering background on the topic, ideas for integrating Catholic values into daily family life, and suggested at-home activities.

The Activity Book includes pages that outline the Rite of Reconciliation and offer an Examination of Conscience. In addition, children are provided with a glossary of important terms used throughout the program.

## Interactive Map

Each sacrament is paired with its own vibrant treasure map—a visual and interactive tool designed to build excitement and encourage progress. As children move through the chapters, they use stickers featuring key biblical images to mark their journey. The map helps them remember important stories and themes as they prepare for their first celebration of the sacrament.

## Stickers

Sticker sheets are included so that the children can track their progress on the treasure map and interact more deeply with the Bible stories. Some stickers help the children mark Featured Stories or key verses that have special meaning to them.

## Music Suggestions

Music brings a joyful and reflective dimension to learning. Each chapter includes two song suggestions that connect to the theme of the lesson. You are welcome to use these songs or incorporate favorites that resonate with your parish community. The suggested songs can be accessed by searching the titles online or by scanning the provided QR codes, which link to a free, curated playlist.

## Videos

Engaging video suggestions are offered in some additional activities to enrich learning experiences. If your setting allows for technology integration, these videos can be a dynamic part of each lesson. Many of the videos are also featured on the family pages in the Activity Book, allowing families to continue exploring the material together at home. Videos can be accessed by searching the titles online or by scanning the included QR codes for instant access to the full playlist.
